### HOLD FAST TO THE TRUTH

The Bible encourages us to pursue sound doctrine. (Titus 1:5-9)

# SOUND DOCTRINE IS OUR LIFE-LONG PURSUIT

Pursuing True Doctrine Unites Us To Jesus And To Each Other. (John 17:17-23)

How might we respond to someone who tells us that theology is a matter of secondary importance?

Can you think of an example of strife or division among people that was caused by doctrinal differences? What are some practical ways that doctrine and theology unify a church?

Pursuing True Doctrine Requires Study And Discernment.

- 1. Sound Doctrine is rarely based on an isolated phrase or verse.
- 2. Sound Doctrine is usually confirmed in church history.
- 3. Sound Doctrine is not based on what you hope the Bible says.

- 4. Sound Doctrine never promises you what God has not promised.
- 5. Sound Doctrine is true at any time in history and in any place on the planet.

- 1. First-level Doctrines: Doctrines that if you don't believe, you're not a true Christian.
- 2. Second-level Doctrines: Doctrines that are important enough that it's best to fellowship in different churches for the sake of unity.
- 3. Third-level Doctrines: Doctrines that might cause disagreement even in the same church.
